## Point ~ in ~ Time Street Outreach Event & Housing Inventory Count

The Point-in-Time (PIT) count is a count of sheltered and unsheltered people experiencing homelessness on a single night in January. (HUD Exchange)

Housing Inventory Count (HIC) is a point-in-time inventory of provider programs within a CoC that provide beds and units dedicated to serve people experiencing homelessness (and, for permanent housing projects, where homeless at entry, per the HUD homeless definition), categorized by five Program Types: Emergency Shelter; Transitional Housing; Rapid Re-housing; Safe Haven; and Permanent Supportive Housing. (HUD Exchange)






#### Race and Ethnicity




#### Tribal Affiliation











#### Reasons for Homelessness

- 38 Total of persons experiencing homelessness due to a Lake County Fire
- 34 Total of persons experiencing homelessness due to COVID
- 25 Total of persons experiencing homelessness due to fleeing a domestic violence situation
- 114 Total persons experiencing homelessness due to being incarcerated
